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

We are gathered here today in memory of our beloved Leonard so we may acknowledge and share both our joy in the gift that his life was to us, and the pain that his passing brings.

Your presence today is a testimony to the hundreds of lives who have benefited from Leonard's talent, enjoyed his company and absorbed a lesson or two in the virtues of hardwork and perseverance that all true and great sportsmen possess.

LEONARD SWANE PICKARD NARTEI TEYE-BOTCHWAY came into this world on the 17th of August 1955. His father was the late Edward Narh Teye-Botchway of the Steele family of Prampram, Greater Accra Region. His father was a sportsman par excellence - a fine athlete himself in his heyday and a pioneer in the teaching of all sports disciplines from the 1940's to the 1980's until he retired. His mother, Grace Sybil Merley Teye-Botchway, (nee Martey), is a retired nursing administrator.

Leonard was the oldest of four children, two boys and two girls. One sibling, Rachel Narkuor Larmie, predeceased both father and Leonard. Surviving siblings are Margaret Amy Naameyah Essamuah and Bernhard Teye-Botchway.

Leonard was born in Kumasi, in the Ashanti region of Ghana, where his parents were working at the time. He started his early education in Takoradi at the home of Mrs Holdbrooke-Smith of blessed memory. Leonard went to St. John's boarding school in Accra for a year and later moved to KNUST primary boarding school until his secondary education in Mfantsipim School.

He attended Mfantsipim from the year 1967 till 1974 with 105 other boys in his year. Hewas in lower dormitory of Balmer- Acquaah house. Need I say he was a smart student and an outstanding athlete who proved his prowess in the field of athletics. He was also a highly skilled hockey player. This endeared him to all around. He was nicknamed Rev Dallas. Leonard was elected House-Prefect in 1973/74 when he entered 6th form.

Throughout secondary school, he was highly respected for his humility and fortitude.

Leonard was amongst 70 freshmen and women who entered the University of Ghana Medical School in 1974 and graduated in 1980. Whilst in medical school, Leonard continued with his sporting activities and was a great athlete during his days at medical school.

From 1978 to 1979 Leonard held the position of General Secretary, Ghana Medical Students' Association. Leonard was the Ghanaian Representative at the International Federation of Medical Students General Assembly held in Austria in 1978.

In 1979 Leonard received the University of Ghana Sportsman of the Year Award. Leonard was a keen athlete and former West African Universities 400m Champion.

He accomplished a lot as an athlete which made both his university and family very proud.

Leonard's post graduate career started out in 1981 at University Teaching Hospital, Accra, Ghana as a House Surgeon and subsequently a House Physician. In 1982 Leonard moved to Nigeria and became the Senior House Officer, Ophthalmology at the University Teaching Hospital.

While at the University Teaching Hospital in Nigeria, Leonard's positions included Registrar, Ophthalmology (1983-1985), Registrar, General Medicine (1985), Registrar, General Surgery (1985), Registrar, Ophthalmology (1985-1986). In 1986 Leonard was promoted to Senior Registrar, Ophthalmology and held the post until 1989.

In 1989 Leonard relocated to the UK and joined the Institute of Ophthalmology at the Moorfields Eye Hospital, London as a Boulter Fellow. In 1990 Dr. Teye-Botchway joined Coventry and Warwickshire Hospital/ Warneford Hospital, Leamington Spa and held the position of Senior House Officer until 1992.

From 1993 to 1995 Leonard held the position of Registrar in Ophthalmology at the St. James's University Hospital N.H.S. Trust, Hull Royal Infirmary, General Infirmary, York District Hospital and Leeds General Infirmary all in Yorkshire England. In 1995 he held the positions of the Senior Clinical Medical Officer and Community Eye Physician at St. James University Hospital N.H.S. Trust, Leeds until 1997.

It was during his time in Leeds that he met his lovely wife Ronita. They met at a church on Bridge Street at a youth event they had both attended. Leonard was apparently hanging around the Youth Pastor and was on his way out to work on call when their first conversation took place. They exchanged numbers and the next magic was a trip to see Bodyguard and a snack of M&Ms which are Ronita's favourites. Within a few months of meeting, they had started dating and married soon after. Their marriage has been blessed with three boys; Adlai, Addon and Addi.

In 1997 Leonard joined Singleton Hospital in Swansea as a Consultant Ophthalmologist. It is worth mentioning that Leonard was involved with the teaching of medical students at The Jos University Teaching Hospital in Nigeria; St. James University Hospital in Leeds, United Kingdom; Singleton Hospital in Swansea, United Kingdom.

On leaving the Singleton Hospital, Leonard relocated to Bermuda. In Bermuda he became the Medical Director of the Bermuda International Eye Institute as the lead Ophthalmic Surgeon and Physician. He was later appointed as the Director of the Center for Vision Rejuvenation in Bermuda with responsibility to introduce innovative, state of the art ophthalmic laser technology to the establishment.

He was the leader in the delivery of ophthalmic care in Bermuda, and for a period of time practiced as the sole Ophthalmic Surgeon and Physician on the island. As Medical Director he pioneered multi-focal lens implantation, Optical Coherence Tomography, selective laser Trabeculoplasty, and Teleophthalmology. Leonard dedicated his life's work to building an advanced clinical ophthalmic service, at the frontiers of innovation, to meet the needs of Bermudians.

Committed to excellence, he established collaborative partnerships with internationally-renowned and preeminent ophthalmic institutions. These institutions include the Wilmer Institute at Johns Hopkins Hospital, Baltimore, Wills Eye Hospital in Philadelphia and the Eye Institute at the Lahey Clinic in Boston.

In 2006 Leonard performed the first multifocal lens implementation in Bermuda. The multifocal lens is a revolutionary and technologically advanced intraocular lens. Unlike other intraocular lenses which are monofocal, the multifocal allows patients the ability to

see both near and far. This ability allows the patient to perform many activities and in most cases dependence on glasses is completely eliminated or greatly reduced.

A year after Leonard introduced state of the art management of retinal diseases to Bermuda, and simultaneously established a link with the Eye Institute of Lahey Clinic to provide enhanced eye care at the Bermuda Eye Institute by Lahey Specialists.

The OCT Technology introduced to Bermuda by him, was the first for the Island.

Leonard collaborated with Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore in the management of problems with Diabetic Retinopathy and has forged a direct Teleophthalmology link (Telemedicine) between Johns Hopkins Hospital and the Bermuda Eye Institute.

A first of such links in the area of Ophthalmology. Leonard had an unwavering commitment to ensure that his staff consistently demonstrated superior quality care ensuring that every patient received the best and most compassionate vision care.

He was also committed to research and continuing medical education. He promoted continuing education here in Bermuda through supervision, training and funding.


He also arranged for the training and professional development of several staff members.

Notably, two of his staff members have achieved a first for resident Bermudians by obtaining the Certified Ophthalmic Assistant certification from the American Society of Cataract and Refractive Surgery (ASCRS). Similarly, he promoted recognition of his Practice Manager to become a member of the American Society of Ophthalmic Administrators (ASOA).

Staff members have also had the opportunity to visit overseas Medical Centers like Lahey Clinic in Massachusetts, and Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore, for continuing education, and had also attended ASCRS and AAO (American Academy of Ophthalmology) conferences.

Leonard's Memberships and Associations included being a Member of American Academy of Ophthalmology, the American Society of Cataract & amp; Refractive Surgeons, the International Society of Refractive Surgery, the Canadian Ophthalmological Society, the Royal College of Ophthalmologists, the British Medical Association and the Pan American Association of Ophthalmology.

Leonard became a Fellow of the West African College of Surgeons in 1988. He was also a Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Glasgow.



Leonard received various awards and attained academic achievements. In 1988 Leonard was the first Ghanaian to pass the final fellowship of the West African College of Surgeons (FWACS) by examination in any specialty. The award was made in February 1989.

In 1989/1990 Leonard was made the Boulter Fellow from the International Center for Eye Health, London. In 2011 he received the International Ophthalmologist Education Award from the American Academy of Ophthalmology. In 2014 the American Academy of Ophthalmology recognised Leonard's lifelong commitment to learning by honouring him with the International Scholar Award.

As an International Scholar, Dr. Leonard Teye-Botchway joined an intellectual elite of Ophthalmologists worldwide. At various times, Leonard had engaged in further studies to improve his practice in the fields of Glaucoma, Diabetic Retinopathy, External Eye Disease and Diabetic Laser, Pediatric Ophthalmology, Corneal and Behcets, Retinopathy of Prematurity, Severe Ocular Infections Course, Vitreo-Retinal, Vitreo-Retinal and External Eye Disease.

In 2008, Leonard was appointed as a Justice of the Peace (J. P.) by the Governor of Bermuda and in 2010, he was appointed as the Technical Advisor to Bermuda Society for the Blind and Visually Impaired. In 2017 he was appointed as a member of Criminal Injuries Compensation Board by the Governor.

Leonard was also appointed as the Honorary Consul of Ghana to Bermuda in 2011 on the recommendation of then Governor of Bermuda. This appointment highlighted the significance of his contributions and people of other nationalities to the Bermuda community. On his appointment, he was the only diplomatic representation of any African country on the Island.

Since his appointment, he has worked tirelessly to promote co- operation between the two countries and its people through economic development, trade, tourism and cultural exchanges and offered assistance to Government Departments in relation to any matters involving Ghana. The highlight of his service to his country was the recent visit of His Excellency Papa Owusu-Ankomah to Bermuda and the doors it opened for future relationships between the two countries.

In collaboration with the Bermuda National Trust, Leonard invested in preserving the building in which Mary Prince (one of Bermuda's National Heroes) lived. The Bermuda National Trust recognized the efforts of Leonard recently in designating the preserved building as a Heritage site. In keeping with a keen interest in the social fabric of the Bermudian Society, Leonard founded the charity arm of the Bermuda International Eye Institute Ltd., the Charis Foundation in 2005.

Through this Foundation, the Institute has been able to assist charities such as Age Concern, the Sunshine League and the Skills Development Program. Under Leonard's auspices, the Bermuda International Eye Institute, organized an annual 5K walk and race event for sixteen years to foster improved community relations and promote physical fitness as well as raise funds for various charitable causes.

Leonard also combined his dual passions for Ophthalmology and sport through his voluntary service. Affiliated to the International Paralympic Committee and International Blind Sports Federation, he achieved 'Visual Impairment International Classifier' status.

During Leonard's family time he enjoyed Christian and church activities, sports and fitness, and anachronistic re-enactments. Leonard was a wildlife and nature enthusiast along with a learner of history.

As we part ways with the wonderful person that Leonard was, let the lessons of his selfless commitment to duty, his family, lifelong learning, Ghana and the Bermuda community guide each of us in the service of others.

DR. LEONARD SWANE PICKARD NARTEI TEYE-BOTCHWAY fought a good fight, and finished the course well. Till we meet again.

His enviable career as an eye surgeon for 30 years and the provision of medical care and succour as well as the knowledge he has imparted will live in our hearts for many years to come.

Doctor fulfilled the words of Mathew 5:16 - "Let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your father in heaven".

His additional numerous credentials of training and collaborating with leading Ophthalmology Centres in the USA and UK and as a qualified Fellow of the Colleges of Surgeons of Glasgow, West Africa and Ghana speak for themselves.

For now, let us pause and give thanks for the fact that Dr. Leonard Teye-Botchway lived as a selfless man who gave his all and toiled to build the foundation for what we believe will lead to an excellent relationship between Ghana and Bermuda. Leonard served humanity with all his strength and might.

intense (intimidating) workouts, in part, found a "gentler" expression in the well-known Annual 5K Runs sponsored by The Eye Institute.

His faith in God: The other components of his life were interesting, but this aspect defined who he wants at the core: a godly man who knew and lived for the Lord. This was the secret to his success. This was the essence of who he was among us as a son of God. This explains why he was excellent in what he put his hands to do. This was my favorite experience of him; those times when we would share what the Lord had been revealing and doing in our lives and the lives of our loved ones.

We are left with and will cherish this impactful memory of Nartei, which will have an ongoing effect on our lives. He has transitioned from time to eternity. His body remains here, but his spirit and soul are now in the presence of God. This is not a sentimental statement, but a declaration of truth, and because it is true, those of us who have a living relationship with God through Jesus Christ are comforted in knowing that we will see him again.

TRIBUTE **UNIVERSITY OF GHANA MEDICAL SCHOOL CLASS OF 1980**



Dr. LSPN Teye-Botchway was part of the group of seventy (70) freshmen and women who entered the University of Ghana Medical School in September 1974 to train as doctors. Ours was the 11th batch of students to the only Medical School in Ghana at that time - now there are five Medical Schools.

We graduated together as the "Class of 1980" and with his sudden death we have lost a great and gentle friend and colleague. We fondly called him "Dallas" or Rev T. Dallas, a nickname from his secondary school days. These last few days have been very hard for the "Class of 1980", after learning of the passing of this exceptional, extraordinary, outstanding, hardworking, good natured, and fun-loving gentleman we all lived, learned, and worked with.

Dallas was not just tall, handsome, always elegantly dressed and usually sporting an Afro hairstyle with moustache and "side burns" to match, but had a genuine beaming smile that brightened everyone's day. He was

remarkably soft spoken, generous, friendly, and very polite. He had a warm and genial personality. His genial personality and quality of being attentive in conversations made everyone feel important in his presence. He spoke in measured and respectful tones, communicating his thoughts clearly and concisely.

While some of us quickly ditched our sporting activities upon entering medical school, (to cope with an intimidating academic workload), "Dallas" managed to continue his sporting activities and was a great athlete who ran the middle distances for the University of Ghana and the Ghana National Athletics Teams. He also played Hockey for the Medical School and the University of Ghana and featured in our class soccer team. We, his Classmates took great pride in his exploits and achievements as an accomplished athlete. He never got angry on the field, nor in life off the field, always demonstrating a gracious trait of encouragement and support of those less gifted than himself.

However, he was also an excellent student and sailed through the Medical School successfully and graduated in 1980 without any hitches.

He was a valued member of our UGMS Class of 1980 group, always up to date with his alumni financial obligations and earlier this year made a substantial donation to the Class welfare fund to support distressed or incapacitated colleagues.

Distance has kept us apart physically but the new internet tools brought us together in recent years. Some of us met with him at a conference of the Ghana Physicians and Surgeons of North America in Atlanta 4 years ago and marveled at how well kept and athletic he looked so many years after Medical School.

We were enthused when Dr Teye-Botchway was appointed the Honorary Consul-General of Ghana to Bermuda and several of us had asked on our WhatsApp platform for him to receive us for a visit to Bermuda, which he warmly agreed to with characteristic generosity. His amazing achievements did not change him -being kind, thoughtful and considerate of others was second nature to him. The news of his demise therefore came as a great shock. We have lost a great friend and an icon who served his profession and nation well.

Dallas, your sudden death saddens us. You meant a lot to us, and we who are left, are grateful for sharing your life with us. We, the classmates of UGMS 1980, wish to express our sincere and deepest condolences to your dear wife, children and the entire family. We pray that the Almighty God protect and grant you the fortitude to bear this colossal loss.

REMEMBERING A CLASS MATE, DR. LEONARD SWANE PICKARD NARTEI TEYE-BOTCHWAY by Mfantsipim Class of 1972 (MOBA-72)

The above scripture passage amply sheds light on life of the dear brother, friend and Classmate we are celebrating today despite the tears in our eyes.



On Tuesday, September 3, 2019, the news of the passing of our dear Teye-Botchway on rocked our the class with great shock just as we were winding our day with some routine banter, jokes, taunts and messages on our Class Platform. The name Leonard Swane Pickard Nartei TEYE-BOTCHWAY, another true brother of Moba 72 Ebusua, Created only by God. The news pierces our hearts like a sharp knife. The pain is too much for us to take. The loss of a classmate hits home very hard. Not true, not real, paling into tearful tributes and recollection of our days in class, dormitories and the playing fields.

Our life's journey with Dallas, as we affectionately called Leonard, began in September 1967 when 105 of us entered the gates of Mfantsipim School to be molded into men for the future development of our nation and the world at large.

He was assigned to Balmer-Acquaah House (Lower Dormitory). It did not take long for him to establish a name for himself as a smart student and star athlete. He was a "sharp brain," our

term for the smart students. He was a fine scholar and many a classmate and others consulted him for support in their learning. On the athletic field, he was a constant presence on the house and school athletics and hockey teams. He proved his prowess in the 440 yards and other middle-distance races, and as a powerful hockey player.

The combination of these two qualities endeared him to both students and staff. He was a gentleman, always well-dressed, humble, and quiet. He hardly got into trouble. Many were surprised that he never let his successes put him in dreamland to act like a wayward celebrity. His humility and soft-spoken character never wavered. His nickname *Rev. T Dallas* was one of respect and honour rather than a taunt for misbehaviour and indiscipline.





With a successful entry into Sixth Form in October 1972, his leadership qualities combined with his all-round academic, athletic and social traits led him being elected House Prefect in the Balmer-Acquaah House (Lower Dormitory) in the 1973/74 academic year when we were in Upper Six. This was in the era of informal assessment of potential prefects by the housemasters. They polled a sample of the student body on the suitability of candidates for leadership positions. He was the hands-down choice.

He was a member of the MOBA72 squad that broke the record for the highest number of admissions to the University of Ghana Medical School, a record that stood for many years. He went on to specialise as a Consultant Opthalmic Physician and Surgeon. It was not a surprise when he set out to move to Bermuda as a pioneer in the field of Ophtalmology. Leonard never failed to demonstrate his prowess with professional excellence to the point of taking the Bermuda

International Institute of Opthalmology to its present world class status.

Leonard, as your Classmate, we are also proud that you were the consummate professional and we were always impressed whenever we read about your acts of compassion and giving back to Society whenever the opportunity presented itself. One story that touched the heart of Class Members was the story about how you led a mission-critical effort to restore the sight of some belugas in the Bermuda Zoo when all hope appeared to have been lost. Dallas, you rose to the occasion one more time. Thank you!!

Kwabotwe, as we call our school, superbly influenced us in many ways allowing us to develop lasting friendships that has endured among us till today. Fifty-Two years later, we still maintain

contact among ourselves and still act like boys when we are together. Oh Death, your action is unacceptable, but you are defeated because our Brother, as a very active member of the Scripture Union, so loved the Lord right from our school days. We are confident that God is waiting to receive him into His Bosom and heavenly vineyard.

We are so proud and elated that Leonard's character found fame in the international circuit when the Government of Ghana appointed him the Honorary Consul of Ghana to Bermuda. In this role, we saw and heard your wide acceptance in the national circles of Bermuda as you fully represented your motherland, Ghana, in your adopted country of residence.

Today, all we can do is express our most sincere gratitude to the Most High God for the significant impact Leonard Teye-



Botchway (alias *Dallas*) made on our lives as the Boys of MOBA72. We also take this opportunity to commiserate with the Spouse, Children and his siblings and family on this great loss. We stand together with them to celebrate this great brother who loomed large in our respective lives.

Leonard, you have lived a worthwhile life here with us. We thank God for your impactful life. Today, we also celebrate you even as we mourn your departure. We know that you have been well received by the Good Lord into His Bosom. We shall forever hold and cherish the memories of your presence.

Our Class has lost a dedicated member, a pillar of strength, a calming voice that rose to the occasion in our activities.

Leonard, your humility, fortitude and forthrightness has indeed encouraged us to be strong and humble so we could face the changing scenes of life.


Dr. Leonard Teye-Botchway, a very proud Ghanaian, provided me with many professional courtesies when I sought medical advice for family members.

Your shoes are very big to fill, but my commitment to you is, that I will continue to be the best me I can be, to think before I act, and from my small sphere, make an impact!


